I then asked for ideas on How to improve the MJR message ...


More catchphrases! e.g. re-legend (religion+legend).

2019 HIGHLIGHTS FROM MITCH

I am in a unique position as I see MJR happening in many Dioceses, both in a BIG and small way. A selection of my highlights ...

Carmen Walsh at CEO Wilcannia Forbes, explained to me how they have an MJR person in every school and once a term they all have a phone hook-up to swap ideas. Every 2nd year they come together and have a two day MJR Conference in Forbes. So effective!

Eugene Lee, Principal, St Denis Catholic Primary School, Joondanna WA, has, over the last nine years organised many schools to come together in Perth for in-services on MJR. Great things are also happening in the Bunbury Diocese, Kalgoorlie, Albany and Perth.

Laura Avery, Head of RE in NT in Darwin, organised cluster meetings with seven schools. The dots are differently joining in NT, as interest and enthusiasm is really growing and spreading. Di-Anne Rowan, Head of RE in the Rockhampton Diocese, has asked each school to have an "MJR Champion", and those people are supported by the Diocese to come to the Melbourne Conference. Catherine Simmons was appointed by the CEO to support schools. Wonderful to have that support from a Catholic Education Office, as it makes such a difference.

Personally, my highlight is going into classes to see and hear kids coming up to me at the end of a lesson, looking me in the eye and saying, a genuine thanks for coming into the class, and that the lessons made sense to them. The same with the teachers, with many saying, "You taught me 13 years ago and I still have my MJR book and the Green Card".

Finally, this blew me away at St Johns in Richmond, Tasmania ...

My nephew, Luke Mitchell's two sons, Sid and Otto were born 22 weeks premature. At the time things were very touch and go. I asked the class to continue to pray for them. Today, 8 months later, I walked into the room and they wanted to know how Otto and Sid were going, as they have been praying daily for them. Their prayers have been answered, as both Sid, Otto, mum Zoe and dad Luke, are one very grateful, happy family, as both boys are strong and well.

GOING TO YOUR HEART ROOM

Nicky Holloway, Year 3 teacher from **St Marys College, Hobart**, has set up a special *Heart Room*^{*} in the corner of her classroom and has shared the story behind its creation ...

"In recent years, our lives seem to have become busier. It became apparent to me that schools need a quiet space for all students, especially those who have Autism Spectrum Disorder or other conditions, that are negatively effected by constant noise and distraction. We began creating a mindful space in our classroom.

Our *Heart Room* is a place where we can practise mindful activities like finger knitting, creating mandalas and reading beautiful prayer cards. It is strongly connected to the <u>Spirit of</u> <u>Jesus</u> program and is a place where we can reflect on the <u>Spirit of Jesus</u> in our lives. Our crucifix, which is made of drift wood, is the focus of our *Heart Room*. Heart Cards identify the values that are the embedded in the <u>Spirit of Jesus</u> program.

The kids love going into their *Heart Room* and after going in, they write in the journal section of their book with:

'I saw the Spirit of Jesus when'

Rosemary O'Rourke, a student teacher and artist, was inspired by the idea of our *Heart Room* concept and was instrumental in the design and creation of our Heart Room. We

are extremely grateful that she helped to create a wonderful space for all students at St Mary's College to reflect on the *Spirit of Jesus* in our lives."






PROMOTING THE SPIRIT OF JESUS
