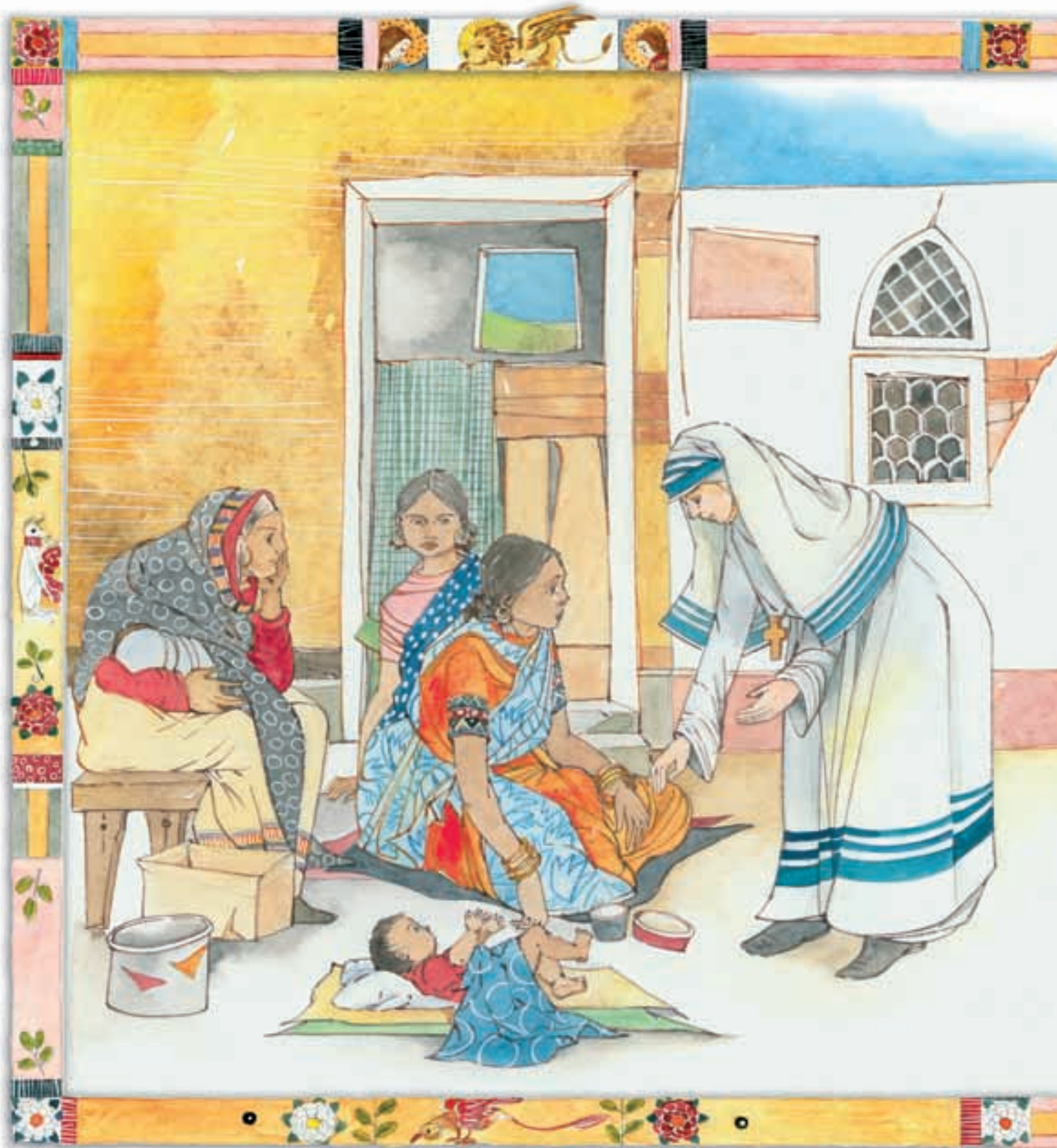
The Saints

I was fascinated by the lives of the missionaries, so when I was eighteen, I joined the Sisters of Loreto and moved to India.

I loved my work teaching young girls, but on a train trip God spoke to me. He wanted me to start a new order of sisters called the Missionaries of Charity who would work with the poorest of the poor—all those people who are unwanted, uncared for, and unloved.

So I went by myself to work in the slums of Calcutta. Many sisters joined me, and we opened houses all over the world to care for the very poor and dying. We lived very simply, like the poor we served.

I often told people how important it is to respect life. Everyone is loved by God, from unborn babies to the homeless people who are living in the streets. Every life is precious.

I used to tell people, “Do something beautiful for God.” It can be something simple, like being kind to your family or visiting someone who is lonely. Remember, when you love and serve others, you are really loving and serving Jesus!
